I understand that the Police will be seeing _____ and possibly many others regarding numerous other shoplifting offences which might ultimately prove the existence of a 'Thieves Kitchen'. Time will tell.

* As such, Centenier Baudains has cancelled the Juvenile Court Hearing for the _____, and a new date will be set and advised when the picture is clearer as to exactly what charges are going to be brought. The question of timing now seems to be in the hands of the Police.

I now intend to see _____ at Haut de la Garenne as soon as practicable to talk through her problems in the hope of eventual reconciliation with her foster home.

Sir,

The facts of this case are as follows:-

- (1) At approximately 17.30 hrs. on [redacted] 1980, an on duty Police Officer telephoned Police Headquarters stating that a female was lying in his driveway at [redacted] and that she appeared unconscious through drink and had vomited all over the place, including over herself.
- (2) W.P.Sgt. Bond and P.C. de la Hays attended and transferred the girl to the General Hospital. At this stage she was unable to supply details of herself. At approximately 19.00 hrs. the hospital contacted Police Headquarters stating that the girl could be released. She was brought to Police Headquarters where her details were established to be [redacted] of [redacted]. She was still very drunk and barely coherent. She gave the name of her parents as [redacted]. These people were contacted and they stated that [redacted] was their foster daughter and attended at Headquarters to collect her. [redacted] stated that [redacted] had gone out with a friend, one [redacted] of [redacted] that afternoon and was supposed to be back home for 18.00 hrs. Arrangements were made for [redacted] to be interviewed the following afternoon at Police Headquarters.
- (3) At 21.00 hrs. on Sunday, I attended at [redacted] with Sgt. Bond. I spoke to [redacted] in the presence of her parents. She stated that she could not help us much, as [redacted] appeared to have been under the influence of some-

thing when she had arrived at [redacted] at about 14.30 that afternoon. She stated that [redacted] had been with her all the time and she did not think she could have got away to consume any alcoholic liquor or pills without her knowing. She stated that she had been acting very foolishly, but could not enlighten us as to the reason why. She was asked repeatedly if alcohol had been consumed, to which she replied no. She was told that she would possibly be seen again if anything to the contrary came to light.

- (4) At 14.00 hrs. on Monday, 10th March, 1980, [redacted] attended at Police Headquarters with [redacted] their Child Care Officer, Mr. R. Davenport, was also in attendance. Initially, during my interview with [redacted] she denied having consumed any alcohol or pills. However, she changed her story and said that she had found a bottle of [redacted] and a bottle of [redacted] behind a cupboard under the stairs in [redacted] block at [redacted]. The [redacted] bottle was almost empty, but there was nearly a full bottle of [redacted]. She stated that she had a drink of [redacted] as she had a headache, and this made her feel better. Her friend [redacted] was not with her. She had gone home, as it was about 17.00 hrs., and [redacted] had discovered the alcohol whilst making her way home too.
- (5) Some time later, [redacted] decided to tell the truth and stated that she had in fact stolen the alcohol the previous Friday (7th March). At about 16.30 hrs. that day she left school in the company of [redacted]. She wanted something to eat, so decided to go into [redacted]. She decided that she would take some bottles of alcohol, she supposed it was for her friends as well as herself. She had insufficient money with her and intended to steal the items. She had heard her friends talking about [redacted]. She asked [redacted] to come with her and to stand beside her so that she would be unobserved. [redacted] apparently remarked for her to be careful as she [redacted] had been caught before.
- (6) [redacted] had a look around, saw that the manager was not in his office overlooking the shop floor, and that both cash till attendants were engaged in conversation. She selected a large bottle of [redacted] and one of [redacted] off the middle shelf on the display. Shielded by [redacted] she placed both bottles into a plastic bag which contained her netball kit. Once this was done, she believes she bought a bar of chocolate and both girls left the shop. She went with [redacted] to her garage and there she sampled a sip out of each bottle and decided that she did not like the [redacted] very much. Both bottles were then hidden in the back of the garage, under some wood, and the girls went home.
- (7) At about 14.30 hrs. on Sunday, 9th March, 1980, [redacted] left home to visit [redacted] and see her friends. She found [redacted] and they recovered the bottles. As she did not like the [redacted] she tipped most of it away and both went over to [redacted] block where they met some friends, boys who live on the estate. [redacted] showed them the bottles, telling them how she had acquired them. Nobody wanted to drink any of it, so she began drinking from the bottle of [redacted]. She believes she consumed about two-thirds before a boy - [redacted] pulled it away from her and tipped the rest away. She then disposed of the other bottle by putting it under the stairs in [redacted] block and she and [redacted] went for a walk to the beach. She remembers very little about what took place after this and has no recollection of passing out or being taken to hospital.

- (8) [redacted] stated that getting the liquor was all her own idea and that [redacted] had only assisted inasmuch as she acted as a 'lookout' and shielded her movements. She stated that nobody else had consumed any of the alcohol, and that this was the first time she had done this sort of thing. She told us that her home life was good but she was in constant dispute with her [redacted] who made her life a misery. She gave this excuse for her behaviour. A statement under caution was recorded from [redacted] in which she expresses regret for her actions.
- (9) At approximately 17.20 hrs. on Monday, 10th March, 1980, I re-interviewed [redacted] in the presence of her parents. After a short time she decided to tell the truth. She states that she met [redacted] on the estate at about 17.00 hrs. on the Friday. [redacted] said that she wanted to get some bottles of drink from [redacted] and she wanted [redacted] to go with her. She assumed that [redacted] intended to steal some alcohol as she knew she had no money as [redacted] asked her to get some as it would look 'funny', their standing in the shop and walking out without buying anything.
- (10) Inside the shop [redacted] was told to stand near [redacted] so that nobody could see what she was doing. [redacted] saw her take a bottle of [redacted] and a bottle of [redacted] off the shelf and put them into a plastic bag with her netball kit. Once this was done [redacted] purchased some sweets and as she was paying for them, [redacted] left the shop. Outside they discussed what to do with the alcohol as neither could take it home. [redacted] states that she suggested they take it to the home of an acquaintance, one [redacted] of [redacted]. This woman is a [redacted] but has a [redacted] with whom [redacted] is friendly.
- (11) [redacted] states that [redacted] asked [redacted] if she would look after the bottles, she thinks that she may have been told they were stolen. [redacted] agreed but said somebody would have to collect them later because of [redacted]. The bottles were handed to [redacted] by [redacted]. She believes the time was just after 17.00 hrs. or thereabouts. At about 18.00 hrs. the same evening [redacted] went back to [redacted] collected the bottles and went to her garage. On the way she tipped most of the [redacted] away. She then secreted both bottles at the rear of the garage.
- (12) At about 14.30 hrs. on the Sunday, [redacted] arrived on the estate. They went to the shop a couple of times for some Coca Cola and Cresta drinks. On the way back the second time they collected the bottles and went to [redacted] block where they met some boys they knew. [redacted] believes [redacted] took only three swigs of [redacted] before [redacted] took the bottle away and emptied the contents. They went for a walk to Green Island, during which time [redacted] was acting strangely and saying odd things to passers by. They went back to [redacted] and [redacted] walked off by herself, stating that she was going home. [redacted] states that [redacted] looked 'okay' to her, so she left her and went home. A statement under caution was also recorded from [redacted] in which she stated that the only reason she went with [redacted] to the supermarket was because she was her friend. She too was sorry for what had happened.
